A Brick Street's Second Life

Anyone who has walked along the 2000 block of East Taylor Street lately might notice a big change especially those familiar with the bumpy charm of the old brick street. In the spring and summer of 2024,


the City of Bloomington began work to restore the bricks, which coincided with the City's plan to redo water and sewer lines in older Bloomington neighborhoods. This project aimed to preserve the historic significance of the street, while upgrading essential infrastructure.

But this transformation is about more than infrastructure - it's a story of neighborhood pride, persistence, and just a little bit of brick dust.

The history behind this one-block street comes from Kurt Hoffman, who moved to the block of East Taylor around 2003. At that time, he was restoring his 100year-old home, and he got to know the neighbors – and the story of the street. He learned about the original brick pavers and how earlier residents had long committed to preserving them. A codicil even existed to ensure brick replacements would stay brick.

Residents like Carole Mulliken were known for keeping an eye on things. If a utility crew removed even a single brick during repairs, neighbors acted quickly. For example, in 2008 a water-line replacement left behind a concrete patch instead of restored brick. Concerned neighbors raised the issue with city leadership.

Taylor Street neighbors share their thoughts

Long-time residents Val and Shirleyan Maeker recall the city asking neighbors for input in the early 1980s, with most voting to keep the brick street. After a while, the Maekers said they almost preferred asphalt for new curbs and gutters. But they were happy the work was going to take place in spring of 2024. "We were surprised and delighted when we found out the city planned to reset the brick after the sewer project was completed. We are so appreciative of what the city has done!"

"We think it gives all our houses great curb appeal. And the brick street just seems to invite people to drive down and take a look at our neighborhood," Shirleyan added.

Gavle Bruno moved to Taylor Street shortly before the city began the street work. "I feel the restoration of the brick street connected us to the original families that lived here," she said. Gayle is grateful the people who lived here a few decades ago had the foresight to file the legal papers protecting the bricks. "When I describe where I live to someone new, the first thing I mention is my street is a brick street. Just like it was 100 years ago.

When told the bricks were "gone," Hoffman offered up 2,000 bricks he had in his backyard. A few neighbors held brick-cleaning parties, and together they cleaned and organized over 13 pallets of bricks. The city picked them up to add to its reclaimed brick inventory.

In 2009, then Public Works Director Jim Karch presented a draft brick street master plan to the city council. It aimed to evaluate and preserve the

remaining 3.4 miles of Bloomington brick streets, which once totaled more than 43 miles. The Historical Preservation Commission reviewed the plan, suggesting certain criteria to prioritize each remaining street. Thanks to the passion and persistence of local advocates, the 2000 block of East Taylor ended up earning a higher rank on the preservation list.

Today, both neighbors and visitors alike enjoy this street, whether walking dogs, pushing strollers, or simply soaking in its unique neighborhood atmosphere.

A little history of the kiln-fired bricks

Restoration of the original bricks, kiln-fired around 1913 from clay sourced near Holiday Pool and Lakeside Country Club, began in 2024 after more than a decade of follow-up and nearby infrastructure work. These bricks, over 110 years old, are nonpermeable, tough and have never been covered by asphalt. While the block was once affectionately known as the "roly-poly" street, its new, smoother surface keeps its timeless charm.
