Do you ever wish you knew more about who built your house? Or, wondered who the people were who lived in your house and what their lives were like? For instance, who lived in your house during the Influenza Pandemic in 1918 and 1919? You can find out quite a bit by using FREE library resources from the Bloomington Public Library and the McLean County Museum of History.

Every home research effort should start with the <u>City Directories</u>. City Directories has two sections. One lists all the residents with their address and occupation, and the second section lists every address

of the city with the name of the occupant. You can find collections of City Directories at BPL and the Museum Library. Research your address in the address section (an "O" beside the name indicates they were the owner). The oldest directory to include the address section was in the 1890s. Once you have found the name of an occupant you can check the name directory to find out more, such as the wife's name, how many children they had and where the different members of the family worked. If you want to know even more, you can check out the <u>census records</u> in Ancestry.com, courtesy of BPL.

If your home is older than 1890, you can continue searching for the name of the first known owner/occupant in earlier city directories to learn when they moved in, and possibly when the house was built. Building permits are a great way to learn who the builder was and when your house was built. Notices of permits were frequently printed in the Pantagraph and can be found by searching in Newspapers.com.

Newspapers.com is a great resource for finding out more about prior owner/occupants or even building permits. In Newspapers.com you can search in the The Pantagraph for the names of people or even search for your address. Enter the name in the search bar, then choose "more information" to limit your search to Bloomington, IL. The search mechanism is not perfect, but it does pick up names pretty reliably. This resource is sometimes available for a free trial membership, or you can consult with a librarian.

We are headed into Fall and Winter this year with reports of gas and electric costs set to skyrocket anywhere from 30-50%. I thought it was important to start researching ways to conserve energy and I wanted to share my findings. Did you know the Bloomington-Normal Ecology Action Center offers an energy efficiency audit of your home? For \$20.00 you will receive a home energy inspection, starter kit, utility bill analysis, and personalized report highlighting home improvement items to help lower

energy costs and Increase your home's energy efficiency. Check out their website to learn more.

Some other simple fixes I found in my research are:

- Install a programmable thermostat. To my surprise these start at around \$15.00
- Block air gaps around plumbing pipes and electrical cables, windows and doors with caulking and weather-stripping.
- Buy some inexpensive foam outlet and light switch sealers, this is a huge source of cold air. A 10 pack is around \$2.00.
- If you are handy or know someone who will assist, pull the trim off of your windows and add additional insulation. You can use expandable spray foam that costs around \$4.00-\$10.00 on average per can. Or, get a roll of traditional insulation and stuff it in the windows.
- You can also put a window insulation film over your windows for \$3.00-\$15.00 for
 multiple windows. You need a hair dryer for most of these applications. Check
 your local hardware store or home supply store for pricing,; be sure to have your
 details with you, accurate measurements and number of windows to insulate.
- Insulate hot water pipes and put a water-heater blanket on your hot water heater.
 A 6 foot piece of pipe insulation is less than \$2.00 and a water heater blanket is around \$25.
- Check your furnace filter every month. At a minimum, change the filter every 3
 months. A dirty filter will slow down air flow and make the system work harder to
 keep you warm or cool wasting energy!

Something that I was unaware of that wastes lots of energy is keeping lamps and electronics plugged in. This wastes energy even when they are not in use. You can easily solve this by unplugging everything or using a power strip that you can simply turn on and off when you are in each room.

Another good tip I found was to clean under and behind all of your appliances. Clean your refrigerator coils on the back and make sure your dryer is lint free and clean. When these appliances are dirty it takes more power to run them.

I hope you found some of these simple and inexpensive ways to help save on your utilities this winter helpful. Let's also remember to check on our neighbors this winter, and maybe we can even help each other save some energy with these simple fixes.

Remember to have a written list of the names you are interested in.

The McLean County Museum of History has been digitizing negatives from The Pantagraph for the past three years, and this collection is a treasure trove of images of houses and people. This collection is divided into four different time periods, covering the time period between 1932 and 1951 (thus far). Once you know the names of people who lived in your home, search for them in the Illinois Digital Archive (idaillinois.org) which is where the negative collections are held. A sampling of those images has already been shared on the Founders' Grove History in Maps website at https://rgridley.wixsite.com/foundgrovemaphistory -- look under "They lived in Founders' Grove."



This image shows the Miller children (Earl, Jackie, David and Frederick) in their pony cart. They lived at 1330 E. Grove with their parents, Earl and Virginia Miller.

To summarize:

- Search in city directories to find the names and occupations of past resident in your house
- Search in Newspapers.com with the names you have found to learn more about the families
- Search in idaillinois.org to find pictures of people who lived in your home.

OR, if you don't want to do all the research, check out the website Founders' Grove History in Maps to see the research Rochelle Gridley has already done about this neighborhood.



Ed is employed by Illinois State University as a Campus Space Planner. Since 2005, his responsibilities have been to oversee the database of 6.8 million square feet of university space. Ed, the oldest of three siblings, grew up in New York City, in borough of Manhattan. Being raised in New York, Ed tested and was accepted to Brooklyn Technical High School which is a 10 story building with an enrollment of 6,000 students, he had a graduating class of 2,000 students. He recalls famous journalist, Geraldo Rivera being the commencement speaker at his graduating ceremony.
